Motility disorders of the gastrointestinal tract can be associated with severe symptomatology. The role of therapeutic gastrointestinal endoscopy in the management of these disorders is rapidly expanding. ESGE has commissioned a new guideline to provide guidance on various

aspects of the endoscopic management of GI motility disorders. Six clinical conditions of abnormal GI motility were identified in which therapeutic endoscopy is one of the treatment possibilities: Zenker's diverticulum, achalasia, GERD, gastroparesis, intractable constipation, and Ogilvie's syndrome.

In this issue of *Endoscopy* you will find the first of two parts of the new guideline. This first installment is dedicated to achalasia and gastroparesis. Part two will focus on Zenker's diverticulum, GERD, intractable constipation, and Ogilvie's syndrome.

We were very happy to have four representatives from the European Society of Neurogastroenterology and Motility (ESNM) contributing to this guideline.
